New Art in the Neighborhood and Vashon High School students participate in For Freedoms

October 8, 2018 (St. Louis, MO) - The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) announces the participation of students from two of its education programs in For Freedoms: The 50 State Initiative. For Freedoms was co-founded by artists Hank Willis Thomas and Eric Gottesman to engage artists and arts institutions more fully in public life. Now active across the nation, For Freedoms, the largest public art initiative in US history, includes exhibitions, installations, billboard campaigns, and public programs that advocate for participatory democracy on a nonpartisan basis.

New Art in the Neighborhood (NAN), CAM's longest running education program, will take part in a For Freedoms workshop on Saturday, October 13. The workshop will include a discussion of political participation through the arts, as well as hands-on sign-making activities. The following week, Saturday October 20, from noon to 2:00 pm, NAN students will serve as facilitators for a public sign-making workshop, free and open to the public. The sign-making will take place in the CAM courtyard or performance space, depending upon the weather. The lawn signs will be designed with the open phrases "Freedom of ______" and "Freedom from ______," with participants encouraged to complete the phrases as they choose. In addition, For Freedoms lawn signs are available to visitors at the front desk during all museum hours.

As part of CAM's ArtReach program, bringing contemporary art and ideas beyond the museum walls, Vashon High School will also be involved in sign-making activities relating to For Freedoms. In the second year of the Vashon + CAM partnership, some fifty sophomores are involved in introductory art classes. CAM implemented a project-based art curriculum at the school during the 2017–18 school year, reintroducing the first consistent art program at the school in five years. An additional art elective course was added this year.
