CAM Spring Exhibitions open Friday, January 17, 2020

December 17, 2019 (St. Louis, MO) - The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) Spring Exhibitions 2020 open Friday, January 17. *Liz Johnson Artur: Dusha*, features thirty years of iconic images drawn from the artist's *Black Balloon Archive*, her ongoing photographic chronicle of the lives of people of the African diaspora. *Derek Fordjour: SHELTER* is the artist's first solo museum exhibiton and includes a site-specific installation of the same name, as well as a series of his signature paintings exhibited on the Project Wall. Marina Zurkow's video *The Thirsty Bird* reflects the dysfunctional relationship between oil and water in our everyday lives, shown on the museum's mezzanine during regular visiting hours and on the building's facade every evening as part of Street Views. In the Education Galleries, *ArtReach: Vashon High School*, features the latest iteration of works created through the Vashon-CAM partnership, now in its third year.

During Opening Night festivities, 2019 DJ-in-residence [Syna So Pro](#) (Syrhea Conaway) returns to CAM to perform music she composed in response to the photography of Liz Johnson Artur. Johnson Artur selected the local music artist for this unique live exchange between music and photography.

Liz Johnson Artur: Dusha

In this touring exhibition organized by the Brooklyn Museum, more than sixty photographs, two videos, and a selection of sketchbooks from Liz Johnson Artur's ongoing *Black Balloon Archive* will be on view. Johnson Artur, a self-described "product of migration"—daughter of a Russian mother and a Ghanaian father—makes pictures driven by a desire for connection, a link to other people of the African diaspora.

Derek Fordjour: SHELTER

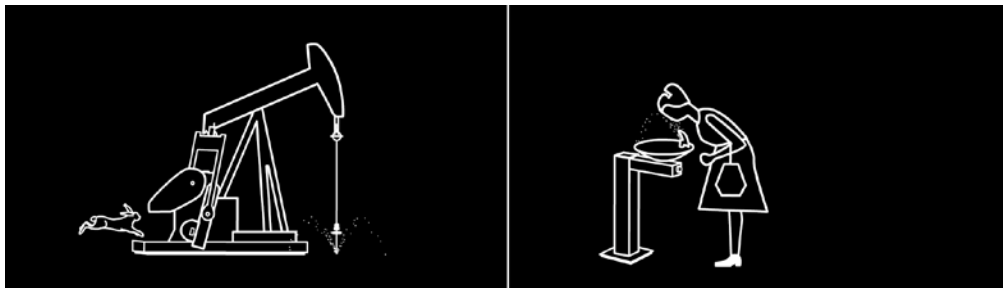
A New York-based artist of Ghanaian heritage, Derek Fordjour works in the realms of figurative painting, installation, and sculpture. For CAM he creates a site-specific, immersive installation, *SHELTER*, a makeshift ramshackle structure that places museum-goers at the heart of a storm. Fordjour's first solo museum exhibition also features the return of CAM's Project Wall, where the artist will hang paintings from his *Player Portraits* series.

Marina Zurkow: The Thirsty Bird

Marina Zurkow is a media artist focused on the intersection of nature and culture, her work offering wry and pointed critiques of this perilously dysfunctional relationship. Her *Street Views* video is inspired by a two-week residency in Texas's Permian Basin, where she met with geologists, naturalists, cattlemen, oilmen, and activists. From these diverse interactions and research, Zurkow offers *The Thirsty Bird*, parallel narratives of two essential, yet incompatible elements, oil and water.
