Jacolby Satterwhite's dream-like virtual worlds arrive at CAM in major

February 10, 2023 (St. Louis, MO) - The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) presents the first major survey of Jacolby Satterwhite's wide-ranging practice in a museum-wide exhibition this spring. An innovator in the fields of 3D animation and performance art, Satterwhite explores and complicates the boundaries between human and digital experience in a series of captivating multimedia works. This exhibition traces more than ten years of Satterwhite's creative output, including 3D animated films, immersive video installations, sculptures, new media pieces, and a selection of recent paintings. Jacolby Satterwhite: Spirits Roaming on the Earth, will be on view at CAM from March 10 through August 13, 2023. As part of the exhibition opening, Jacolby Satterwhite will discuss his work on Friday, March 10th in conversation with writer, critic, and educator Sasha Bonét starting at 6:00 pm.

Mapping the artist's extraordinary creative trajectory, this exhibition explores a decade of Satterwhite's conceptual practice across multiple materials, genres, and modes of thinking. His work frequently draws on a broad set of personal and cultural influences that include video gaming, art history, mythology, and contemporary visual culture. Many of these works also incorporate references to home and family life, especially to the artist's late mother, Patricia Satterwhite, a prolific artist, writer, and musician in her own right. With these creative inputs, Satterwhite builds digital worlds of resilience and reinvention, in which virtual space becomes a new frontier for queer experience and self-expression. His intricately

detailed animations and live action films of real and imagined spaces— populated by voguing avatars of Satterwhite and his friends—serve as the stage for the artist's surreal and poetic world-building.



"Jacolby Satterwhite is an extraordinary innovator in the digital art world," said Executive Director Lisa Melandri. "We are so excited to share his groundbreaking works at CAM. Jacolby is a visionary thinker whose environments and exhibitions exist as their own worlds. We can't wait to invite CAM's visitors into his world this spring."

In addition to exploring the artist's video installations, sculptures, and multimedia works—which will span the entirety of the museum—visitors will be invited to take part in an immersive virtual reality experience created by Satterwhite. The exhibition will also be accompanied by the published monograph *Jacolby Satterwhite: How lovly is me being as I am*, edited by Elizabeth Chodos and Andrew Durbin with narration by Sasha Bonét; essays by Malik Gaines, Jane Ursula Harris, and Legacy Russell; an interview with the artist by Kimberly Drew; and book design by Sonia Yoon.

Jacolby Satterwhite (b. 1986, Columbia, South Carolina; lives and works in Brooklyn) received his BFA from the Maryland Institute College of Arts, Baltimore, and his MFA from the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia. Satterwhite's work has been presented in numerous exhibitions and festivals internationally, including most recently at the Lincoln Center for Performing Arts, New York (2022); Miller Institute for Contemporary Art at Carnegie Mellon University, Pittsburgh (2021); Haus der Kunst, Munich (2021); the Gwangju Biennale, Gwangju (2021); the Wexner Center for the Arts, Columbus, Ohio (2021); The Fabric Workshop and Museum, Philadelphia (2019); Pioneer Works, New York (2019); the Whitechapel Gallery, London (2019); the Museum of Modern Art, New York (2019); the Minneapolis Institute of Art (2019); the Museum of Contemporary Art, Chicago (2018); La Fondation Louis Vuitton, Paris (2018); the New Museum, New York (2017); the Public Art

Fund, New York (2017); the San Francisco Museum of Art (2017); and the Institute of Contemporary Art, Philadelphia (2017). He was awarded the United States Artist Francie Bishop Good & David Horvitz Fellowship in 2016. His work is included in the collections of the Museum

of Contemporary Art Kiasma, Helsinki; the Museum of Modern Art, New York; the Studio Museum in Harlem, New York; and the Whitney Museum of American Art, New York, among others. Satterwhite has collaborated with several musicians, including Solange Knowles on her visual album *When I Get Home* (2019) and Perfume Genius on his album *Ugly Season* (2022).
