

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New Art in the Neighborhood exhibition at CAM features DIY holograms, sand paintings, and creative reflections on identity

August 1, 2023 (St. Louis, MO) - The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis presents a new exhibition of works made by high school artists in the <u>New Art in the Neighborhood</u> (NAN) program. *New Art in the Neighborhood: How to Change Yourself World* highlights new work created by teen artists during the 2022–2023 academic year. **The exhibition is on view in CAM's Education Galleries between September 8, 2023 and February 11, 2024.**

New Art in the Neighborhood (NAN) is a high school-level art course that combines project-based learning with open studio exploration. The program introduces new art practices to creative teens while also responding to each student's individual interests and curiosities.

The exhibition includes artwork made by students during the 2022–2023 academic year with Resident Teaching Artists (RTA) Lillian Gardner and Mee Jey. While working with students on creative prompts, Gardner asked the question: what do you want to change in the world? Using a variety of materials, including wood, collage, sand, and fabric, students

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engaged with meaningful issues and found inspiration in themes such as identity, environment, and legacy. They also had the opportunity to participate in workshops with 2022 *Great Rivers Biennial* artists Yvonne Osei and Jon Young. Similarly, Mee Jey asked students to be deeply reflective in order to find their strengths. Using fabric and found items, the students created artworks that were just as much about the woven intricacies of human identity as they were about the materials.

Inspired by the work in Jacolby Satterwhite's exhibition, *Spirits Roaming on the Earth*, CAM Teen and Adult Programs Manager Brandon Barr worked with students to create DIY holograms. Using common materials—a wooden box, CD case, and a cell phone—students followed techniques taught by RTA Mee Jey to create the illusion of objects and figures moving within a real miniature diorama. This project offered students new ways to explore ideas surrounding identity and personal utopias through digital and sculptural media.
