"CAM, through their *ArtReach: The Art of Caring* project, has provided these students with the opportunity to express their views on social justice and healing within their own communities, state, country and even the world through artwork—equipping these young scholars with the tools to better help them conquer challenges they may face in the future," said Rep. Bosley. "I believe it is important to not only honor students with House Resolutions for the hard work they put into this exhibition, but to show these students that their artwork is a valuable part of the community in St. Louis as well as the state of Missouri."

The ArtReach initiative started in 2017 as a collaboration with Vashon High School, providing weekly art classes throughout the year to ensure consistent art curriculum is available for students. Classes are taught by CAM's Resident Teaching Artists as well as museum educators. CAM expanded its ArtReach Partnership program in 2021 to include the historic Sumner High School, which came as part of a broader revival effort that CAM and other community partners infused into Sumner—the first African American high school west of the Mississippi—to prevent its closure.

"I'm incredibly proud of CAM's longstanding dedication to nurturing the creative talents of our youth," said Melandri. "This conversation began earlier this year when a few of our CAM staff members had the privilege of meeting with Rep. Bosley in Jefferson City during Arts Advocacy Day. We were delighted to hear of her idea to honor each and every student with an individual House Resolution, recognizing the transformative power of art in their lives and in the St. Louis community."

About the Exhibition

ArtReach: The Art of Caring is the product of a semester-long focus on questions of social justice and healing with visual art students at Sumner and Vashon High Schools. Using the media of performance, photography, graphic design, and printmaking, Resident Teaching Artists Colin McLaughlin, Jeremy Rabus, and Rodrick Whetstone facilitated student exploration and consideration of key questions: What makes a problem a societal issue? Why do these problems persist? What roles can visual art play in addressing these issues? Students were asked to consider these questions and the role that they could play. The outcome is a collection of Nick Cave-inspired wearable art pieces, narrative photography, and both digital and print posters that document the students' research and the societal problems that concern them the most.
