We Find Ourselves celebrates 30 Years of Teens Making Art in CAM's Education Galleries, opening September 5, 2025

August 4, 2025 (St. Louis, MO)—The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) presents *We Find Ourselves: 30 Years of Teens Making Art*, an exhibition honoring three decades of partnership between CAM and teens who live and go to school in surrounding neighborhoods. Featuring work by student artists from CAM's long-running New Art in the Neighborhood (NAN) and ArtReach programs, the exhibition traces the legacy of these initiatives through artwork, archival materials, and personal reflections from past and present participants. *We Find Ourselves* will be on view in CAM's Education Galleries from September 5, 2025–February 8, 2026.

It all started in the 1990s when a small group of neighborhood teens wandered into the Museum—then known as the Forum for Contemporary Art—and were captivated by what they saw. This moment sparked the creation of NAN, a program that opened the Museum's doors to young people eager to explore contemporary art. Over the years, CAM has deepened its investment in youth education, providing access, mentorship, and opportunities to hundreds of student artists across the region.

We Find Ourselves opens with recent works by students at Vashon and Sumner High Schools through CAM's ArtReach Partnership, an initiative launched in 2017 that offers weekly art classes embedded in school curriculum. Since 2021, the program has expanded to include the historic Sumner High School, offering students hands-on access to contemporary art practices and mentorship from Resident Teaching Artists.

"This is a celebration of what can happen when young people are given the space, tools, and support to express themselves," says Miriam Ruiz, CAM's Education Manager. "Over the past 30 years, we've seen how art can connect teens to new possibilities—and just as importantly, how their voices can reshape our understanding of what museums should be."

The second gallery offers a look back at key milestones from the past three decades, including the 1995 NAN student showcase *We Find Ourselves in the Life Around Us*, which inspired the title of the current exhibition. Through stories, photographs, artwork, and a detailed timeline, the exhibition demonstrates CAM's evolving role in the neighborhood while honoring the creative legacy of its youth programs.

By bringing together collaborative public artworks of the past and recent multidisciplinary projects—*We Find Ourselves* highlights how consistent, responsive arts education can shape not just individual artists, but entire communities.
