Enjoy conversations, performances, and hands-on art experiences centering accessibility and shared communal space during First Friday: Gather 'Round at CAM on November 7

October 29, 2025 (St. Louis, MO)—The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) presents First Friday: Gather 'Round on November 7 from 5:00 pm–9:00 pm. As part of First Fridays in Grand Center, this evening centers accessibility as a shared creative practice, inviting visitors to authentically share communal space. Presented in dialogue with Access Is an Invitation: CAM Connect Showcase, members of CAM's Disability Justice Steering Committee and local artists will activate the Performance Space through conversations, performances, and hands-on art experiences that explore the question: What does it mean to truly feel welcome?

Throughout the evening, visitors are invited to take part in a range of drop-in activities. Highlights include a pop-up art display by Angela Botz, a collaborative fabric art activity with Asia Johnson-Brimmage of Artists First, and a hands-on book art activity with Martha Valenta. Healing Spaces STL will host an interactive station exploring intersectional identities, accompanied by a dance performance by Gray Wilde. At 8:00 pm, guests are invited to experience the activation of Haegue Yang's Mound Vehicles—a new work commissioned by CAM that takes inspiration from Cahokia Mounds, engaging the region's

precolonial history and the Mississippi River landscape. This work is currently on view in CAM's Main Galleries as a part of *Haegue Yang: Quasi-Heartland*.



Snacks will be provided and drinks available for purchase. This program is free and open to the public; no registration required.

In addition to the festivities, visitors will have the opportunity to view <u>CAM's fall 2025</u> <u>exhibitions</u> as the galleries will be open late until 9:00 pm—including *Access is an Invitation*, which features collaborative quilts made by Central Baptist Church elders; artwork developed through CAM's Tornado Relief Summer Camp and at Fountain Park as part of 314 Oasis; and reflections from the North St. Louis Creative Field Guide, a growing resource rooted in neighborhood storytelling and cultural knowledge.

Visitors are also encouraged to contribute to the Disability Justice Dreamer Space, an interactive installation that invites the public to imagine accessible futures and celebrate community-driven artmaking. This space fosters dialogue around disability justice, collaboration, and what it means to belong. The fall 2025 exhibitions will be on view through **February 8, 2025**.
