Local artist Janie Stamm highlights the importance of preserving queer and natural history in the face of climate change in a new exhibition at CAM presented by Teen Museum Studies, opening March 6, 2026

October 16, 2025 (St. Louis, MO)—The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) presents an exhibition of work by local artist, Janie Stamm, which has been organized by high school students in CAM's Teen Museum Studies (TMS) program. TMS is a summer-intensive internship that guides high school-aged participants through the process of selecting a St. Louis-based artist and presenting an exhibition of their work at the Museum. TMS interns not only receive direct exposure to museum careers, collaboration, and critical thinking skills, but also the chance to work closely with a practicing artist. The 2025 TMS cohort selected Janie Stamm to develop an exhibition that centers on preserving queer and natural history in the face of climate change. The resulting exhibition, Janie Stamm: Mermaid's Purse, will be on view at CAM from March 6, 2026–August 9, 2026.

Stamm's practice incorporates embroidery and natural, found objects such as shells, sea sponges or undersea plants. Her work is deeply inspired by her connection to queer culture, the ecology of her hometown in Florida, and the childhood memories that reside within its landscape. The 2025 TMS cohort selected her work for its profound and emotional impact, recognizing its ability to encourage viewers to critically examine crucial contemporary topics

such as rising sea levels, queer spaces, and the ways their interwoven histories are impacted by climate change.

About the artist



Janie Stamm (b. 1988) is an artist based in Pacific, MO. Born and raised on the edge of the Everglades in Broward County, FL, her work focuses on exploring the links between Floridian ecology and queerness in the face of climate change through fibers and sculpture.

Stamm received an MFA in Visual Art from Washington University in St. Louis, where she received the Dubinsky Scholarship for study at the Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown, MA and the Frida Kahlo Creative Arts Award. She has received additional awards from the Regional Arts Commission of St. Louis, Critical Mass, and The Luminary with support from The Andy Warhol Foundation. She has been an artist in residence at ACRE, the Cite Internationale des Arts, Aquarium Gallery, SAFTA, and Craft Alliance. Her work has been featured in outlets including *Poetry Magazine* and *CandyFloss*. She regularly

exhibits her work throughout the United States and her most recent solo exhibition was in 2025 at the Kranzberg Arts Foundation in St. Louis.



About Teen Museum Studies

Teen Museum Studies (TMS) is a summer intensive internship that engages high school students through direct exposure to museum careers, fosters collaboration and critical thinking, and provides the opportunity to select and work with a St. Louis—based artist to organize an exhibition debuting at CAM the following spring/summer season. For students interested in professional development in the arts beyond artmaking, TMS offers a unique chance to strengthen writing skills, gain hands-on experience collaborating with artists, and build a curatorial skillset. The program culminates in a student-curated exhibition in CAM's Education Galleries, shaped by the creativity and mentorship of local artists.
