**CAM St. Louis and Counterpublic present Tony Cokes's tribute to the legend Tina Turner in a video work for Street Views, projected on the Museum's facade, opening on September 10**

**August 12, 2026 (St. Louis, MO)**—The Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis (CAM) is pleased to present a new video installation by Providence, RI-based visual artist Tony Cokes in collaboration with Counterpublic. As one of the largest public art exhibitions in the US, the triennial will present new commissions and artworks by nearly 50 artists, duos, and collectives across key St. Louis sites including CAM, Kemper Art Museum, Kranzberg Arts Foundation, The Luminary, Pulitzer Arts Foundation, and the Saint Louis Art Museum, among others. The video installation at CAM is part of Cokes's multi-sited project for [Counterpublic 2026: Coyote Time](#), which includes an installation in the sanctuary of Antioch Baptist Church in The Ville neighborhood and a series of outdoor billboards bridging the two sites. **Tony Cokes will be on view at CAM from September 10, 2026–February 7, 2027 and from September 10–December 12, 2026 at Antioch Baptist Church and outdoor billboard locations.**

Since the 1980s, Cokes has developed a visual language all his own, drawing from pop culture sources—including songs, critical theory texts, news reports, and courtroom documents—and remixing fragments of the media landscape to confront issues of structural racism, power, and visibility. Cokes's tightly choreographed video essays layer found text over monochromatic color fields, often set to dissonant soundtracks that echo the rhythms of advertising even as they subvert them. The result is a propulsive, immersive form that makes reading text feel visceral.

This newly commissioned work explores the global legacy of Tina Turner, the “Queen of Rock and Roll” whose musical career began in St. Louis, as well as how she is remembered by the community. Created for St. Louis, *TT the River Won't Stop (Edit)* reanimates archival material related to Tina Turner, including her time at Sumner High School in The Ville neighborhood, where she lived as a teenager in the 1950s. Built from interviews with members of Antioch Baptist Church's congregation, public documents, and Cokes's own memories of growing up with a mother who adored Turner's music, the piece centers Turner even as it grapples with the appropriation and extraction of Black culture by other communities, and celebrates the resilience of The Ville and neighborhoods like it in the face of structural racism. As it moves between celebration and anger, the work resists a single interpretation.

Cokes's work transforms CAM's facade into a public gallery as part of the Museum's ongoing Street Views series. The video will be projected nightly between dusk and midnight, freely accessible to all passersby.

**Tony Cokes** (b. 1956, Richmond, VA) lives and works in Providence, Rhode Island, where he serves as Professor in the Department of Modern Culture and Media at Brown University. Cokes was awarded a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship in 2024 and the Rome Prize in 2022–23. A solo presentation of his work, *Texts, Tracks, Talks* (1992–2026), will open at The Institute of Contemporary Art at Virginia Commonwealth University, on September 18, 2026. Other recent

### About Counterpublic

Counterpublic is a triennial exhibition reimagining the possibilities of art in public life. Located in St. Louis, MO, Counterpublic connects art with lasting impact by bringing together bold ideas with the region's most pressing challenges. As one of the largest public art exhibitions in the nation, Counterpublic celebrates and spotlights the St. Louis region as an epicenter of art and culture through ongoing partnerships and artistic programming. The focal point is a three-month, citywide exhibition with dozens of the world's leading artists.

### **About *Coyote Time***

Opening this fall, Counterpublic 2026: *Coyote Time* spans the storied City of St. Louis, engaging historic sites, world-renowned art institutions, and beloved community spaces. The title derives from artist Alice Bucknell's 2026 Triennial commission, marking the moment in a video game when a character leaps off a cliff and is suspended in midair, unsure of what comes next. This moment of anticipation guides the exhibition, positing uncertainty as a space for experimentation and possibility.

Collectively curated by Jordan Carter, Raphael Fonseca, Stefanie Hessler, Nora N. Khan, and Wanda Nanibush, the exhibition builds on Counterpublic's mission to connect art with lasting systemic change. *Coyote Time*, Counterpublic's third edition, presents new commissions and historical reinterpretations by nearly 50 contemporary artists, free and welcoming to all across key St. Louis sites from September 12–December 12, 2026.

### **About *Street Views***

*Street Views* turns CAM inside-out, transforming its stainless steel mesh facade into a 60' x 16' public gallery through video installations which are on view every evening from dusk to midnight. Rotating twice a year, these public artworks by important contemporary artists visually redefine the Grand Center Arts District—contributing to a more vibrant, and uniquely artistic cultural hub. Since 2013, *Street Views* has exhibited the work of more than 20 internationally acclaimed artists and artist collectives such as Jennifer Steinkamp, Lorna Simpson, Oliver Laric, Marina Zurkow, Paul Chan, Charles Atlas, and more.
